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



Background

The State is statutorily required to develop and update a comprehensive state strategy every three years. Previous strategies were released in 2009, 2014, and 2018







Draft Priorities

The Strategy should drive action toward critical priorities:



Strengthen protections for climate vulnerable communities



Advance public health and safety under a changing climate



Build a climate resilient economy



Accelerate nature-based climate solutions



Make decisions based on best available climate science



Leverage resources for climate action through partnerships and collaboration

Structure

Outcomes will advance multiple Administration priorities and reinforce California's values.

For Example:

- PRIORITY: Advance public health and safety under a changing climate
- GOAL: Reduce health impacts of wildfire smoke
- ACTION: Launch Smoke Ready California Campaign prior to the 2021 wildfire season



Draft Priorities



Advance public health and safety under a changing climate

Example:

• GOAL: A resilient transportation system that can effectively provide mobility to people and goods in the face of uncertainty, either from climate change, earthquakes, natural disasters, pandemics, or other disruptions.

Draft Priorities



Build a climate resilient economy

Example:

• GOAL: Raise awareness of climate risks in the business community and assist businesses to operate with minimal interruption during and after extreme climate events or emergencies.





Accelerate nature-based climate solutions

Example:

• GOAL: Reconnect aquatic habitat to help fish and wildlife endure drought and adapt to climate change.

Draft Priorities



Make decisions based on best available climate science

Example:

• **GOAL:** Leverage climate projections to inform cost-effective, resilient design of low-carbon energy systems.

Draft Priorities



Leverage resources for climate action through partnerships and collaboration

Example:

• GOAL: Align and improve permitting to help launch and incentivize more restoration, multibenefit, and multi-partner projects.
