



SUMMARY OF FEDERAL GRANT FUNDING AWARDED TO THE STATE OF CALIFORNIA

Fiscal Year 2021

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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Federal grant funding awards (obligations) reflect one type of federal funding, in addition to direct payments, contracts, loans, insurance, and other forms of spending.

During Federal Fiscal Year (FFY) 2021 (October 1, 2020 to September 30, 2021), federal grant funding to California¹ totaled \$173 billion, 40% more than the previous year and nearly twice that of FFY19.

California received approximately 13% of all federal grant funding awarded both domestically and internationally.

Approximately one-third of all federal grant funding to California was from supplemental Disaster Emergency Fund spending from COVID-19 legislation and the American Rescue Plan Act.

Federal grant funding per capita in California in FFY21 was \$4,372, greater than both the national average of \$3,942 and more than California's previous per capita of \$3,126 in FFY20.

Schools in California received over \$11 billion in federal funding in the 2021 fiscal year, about one and a half times more than the previous year.

City governments in the state received over \$6 billion in federal revenue in FY21, more than twice the previous year.

County governments in California received nearly \$19 billion in federal revenue in FY21, 30% more than the previous year.

Special Districts in the state received nearly \$4 billion in federal revenue in FY21, 67% more than the previous year.

The California State government reported federal expenditures of \$228.3 billion FY21, which includes \$92.7 billion in Unemployment Insurance and \$11.8 billion in SNAP otherwise classified as Direct Payments, not Grants.

California State government agencies and departments reported over 554 applications to and 529 awards of federal grants in FY21.

OPR facilitated live training in federal grant management to approximately 100 individuals, with thousands more viewing the recordings uploaded to the YouTube page.

INTRODUCTION TO FEDERAL GRANTS

Federal grants (also known as federal financial assistance awards) are one of the most significant ways that the United States federal government supports a broad array of initiatives both domestically and internationally. Federal grants are just one type of financial aid provided by the federal government, along with direct payments, contracts, loans, insurance, and other forms of spending. In Federal Fiscal Year 2021 (October 1, 2020 to September 30, 2021), the federal government obligated over \$10.1 trillion in spending, of which \$1.4 trillion (14%) was through federal grants.

Federal grant programs are identified by their five-digit (such as 84.425) Catalog of Federal Domestic Assistance (CFDA) Program number, now called the Assistance Listing Number. Additional information on each funding program can be found by searching the Assistance Listings at SAM.gov, and detailed funding information can be found at USASpending.gov.

The process of federal grant funding begins with appropriations authorized by Congress, followed by allocations made by the Department of the Treasury to specific agency spending accounts. Federal agencies then obligate those funds through grant awards. The grant funding amounts used in this report primarily reflect those obligations. Last, federal agencies authorize payments, called outlays, to indicate grant award funds that have been paid to the recipient.

OPR FEDERAL GRANT RESOURCES

Assembly Bill (AB) 1348 (Irwin, Chapter 444, Statutes of 2016) authorizes the State Clearinghouse within the Governor's Office of Planning and Research (OPR) to establish a Federal Grant Administrator to serve as a primary point of contact for information on federal grants related to community, economic, and local development. This legislation requires the Federal Grant Administrator to prepare this annual report, as outlined below:

"On or before January 1, 2018, and annually thereafter, the Federal Grant Administrator shall prepare a summary of federal grant funding to the state that includes, but is not limited to, all of the following performance metrics:

- (1) Number of federal grants awarded to the state during the three years prior to the establishment of the Federal Grant Administrator and during the report year.
- (2) Number of completed federal grant applications submitted by the state during the report year.
- (3) Total federal dollars received by the state through federal grants during the report year.
- (4) Total federal grant dollars expended by the state during the report year.
- (5) Total federal grant dollars received in the state by school districts and local governments during the report year.
- (6) Number of training sessions hosted by the Federal Grant Administrator and attendance at those events during the report year.

(7) Other relevant information regarding federal grant activities within the state during the report year, as determined by the federal grant administrator.”

(Gov. Code, § 65040.11.5, subd. (c).) The “report year” for this report is the Federal Fiscal Year 2021 (FFY21), which represents the time period of October 1, 2020 to September 30, 2021. Some financial data in this report provided by State sources (for State Government, School Districts, Cities, Counties, and Special Districts) uses the State Fiscal Year 2021 (FY21) of July 1, 2020 to June 30, 2021. Data reported by USASpending.gov is updated regularly and may not reflect current figures.


The State Clearinghouse serves as the State's Single Point of Contact for the review of federal assistance applications pursuant to Presidential Executive Order No. 12372. Notification of all federal assistance applications must be provided to the SCH pursuant to AB 1348, which in turn publishes this information for review and comment by State and local elected officials. As described in State Administrative Manual (SAM) Section 0912, all State agencies and departments file their request for new federal funds through the SCH and then through Finance through a Standard Form 424 notification prior to applying for funds.

The OPR website contains a page for [Intergovernmental Review of Federal Programs](#) where all applicants to federal grant programs shall provide notification prior to applying for funds.

NATIONAL OVERVIEW


U.S. spending in FFY21 totaled over \$10.1 trillion, one trillion dollars more than the previous year's total of \$9.1 trillion. Prior to the COVID-19 pandemic and response, total U.S. spending between FFY17 through FFY19 averaged over \$6 trillion. The growth in funding was primarily due to the increase in "fixed charges" (such as Social Security benefits and Coronavirus payments), although federal grants also increased greatly from an average of less than \$800 billion in FFY17 through FFY19 to \$1 trillion in FFY20 and \$1.4 trillion in FFY21.




Of the \$1.4 trillion of federal grant funding obligated in FFY21, 95% (\$1.3 trillion) was spent within the United States (50 states, D.C., and multiple states). Another 3% (\$41 billion) was spent in the U.S. territories and associated places (including Puerto Rico, the U.S. Virgin Islands, American Samoa, Guam, other insular areas), and 2% (\$22 billion) was spent in foreign nations and places unaffiliated with the U.S.

The per capita federal grant funding for the United States (50 states and D.C.) was \$3,942 in FFY21. Among the 50 U.S. states (excluding D.C. and U.S. territories and associated places), per capita grant funding ranged from a high of \$8,306 in Alaska to a low of \$2,772 in Utah.






CALIFORNIA OVERVIEW

The total amount of federal grant funding obligated in California² totaled nearly \$173 billion in FFY21, about 13% of the total \$1.4 trillion obligated nationally and internationally. Federal grant funding to California increased 40% from the previous year's total of \$123 billion and was nearly double the \$87 billion total in FFY19. The per capita federal grant funding to California was \$4,372 in FFY21, greater than that year's national average of \$3,942 and the previous year's average of \$3,126 per capita for the state.


Federal grant obligations do not include other forms of financial assistance such as direct payments, contracts, loans, insurance, and other forms of spending.

Of the nearly \$173 billion in federal grants awarded to California, nearly one-third (\$54 billion) was from supplemental funding authorized in response to COVID-19 and the American Rescue Plan Act. This supplemental funding is identified by its Disaster Emergency Fund Code (DEFC) indicating the authorizing funding legislation as follows:


- L: Coronavirus Preparedness and Response Supplemental Appropriations Act, 2020;
- M: Families First Coronavirus Response Act;
- N: Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act or the CARES Act;
- O: Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act or the CARES Act; Paycheck Protection Program and Health Care Enhancement Act; Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2021;
- P: Paycheck Protection Program and Health Care Enhancement Act;
- U: Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2021; and
- V: American Rescue Plan Act of 2021.



Some awards have multiple DEFC codes and are counted in multiple categories. See Appendix B for the amount of supplemental funding awarded to California by category.


California's nearly \$173 billion in federal grants were awarded through 27 different federal agencies. Over \$109 billion (63%) was awarded by the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS), mostly through the \$76 billion Medical Assistance Program (Assistance Listing 93.778), or Medicaid. The Department of Education (ED) awarded over \$31 billion, mostly through its \$25 billion Education Stabilization Fund (Assistance Listing 84.425) created through supplemental COVID-19 funding. The Department of Transportation awarded nearly \$12 billion to California, over half of which was awarded by its Federal Transit Administration (FTA). The United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) and the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) both awarded about \$5 billion each to California. All other federal agencies awarded less than \$2 billion each to the state in grant funding.

CALIFORNIA GRANT FUNDING BY FEDERAL AGENCY

DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES (HHS): \$109,089,613,660




The Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) awarded over \$109 billion in grants to California in FFY21, or 63% of all grant funding awarded to the state and more than three times the funding of the next highest agency.

The total amount of HHS funding to California has increased significantly over the past two fiscal years from a low of \$63 billion in FFY19 to \$85 billion in FFY20 to \$109 billion in FFY21.

DEFC funding in response to COVID-19 accounted for \$18 billion (17%) of all HHS grant funding to California in FFY21.

Nearly three-fourths of HHS grant funding (\$79 billion) to California was awarded through the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS), a subagency of HHS, responsible for the \$76 billion Medical Assistance Program (93.778), or Medicaid. Because of the scale of Medicaid in relation to all federal grants, annual changes in total grant funding are sensitive to annual changes in the Medicaid matching rate.




After Medicaid, the next largest HHS grant programs awarded to California were the \$4.9 billion Child Care and Development Block Grant (93.575), the \$3.9 billion Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (93.558), the \$3.6 billion Epidemiology and Laboratory Capacity for Infectious Diseases (93.323), and the \$3.3 billion Children's Health Insurance Program (93.767).

Nearly three-fourths of HHS grant funding to the state was awarded to the California Department of Health Care Services, most of which was used for payments of medical assistance through the Medical Assistance Program.

HHS awarded grants to California through 14 subagencies in FFY21. The amount of grant obligations by subagency is found in Appendix B.

DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION (ED): \$31,483,550,119



The Department of Education (ED) awarded over \$31 billion in grant funding to California in FFY21, approximately 18% of all grant funding awarded to the state.

The \$31.5 billion in grant funding awarded to California by ED in FFY21 was more than three times the \$9.3 billion awarded the previous fiscal year, and more than five times the average from FFY17 through FFY19.


This funding increase is due to DEFC funding, which totaled \$25.8 billion in FFY21, 82% of all ED grant funding awarded to the state.

The largest ED grant program in FFY21 was the Education Stabilization Fund (84.425), which provided California \$25.5 billion (81%) to prevent, prepare for, and respond to the coronavirus COVID-19 disease pandemic. Other top grant programs in terms of funding to California are \$2 billion in Title I Grants to Local Education Agencies (84.010), \$1.6 billion in Special Education Grants to States (84.027), \$364 million in Rehabilitation Services Vocational Rehabilitation Grants to States (84.126), and \$238 million in Supporting Effective Instruction Grants (84.367).

The top recipient of federal grant funding from ED was the California Department of Education, which was awarded \$22 billion (70%), most of which was formula funding distributed to Local Educational Agencies and other educational entities through the Education Stabilization Fund.

ED funding is not divided by subagency. Further information on funding to schools in California is detailed in the Schools chapter.

DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION (DOT): \$1 1,887,842,870




The Department of Transportation (DOT) awarded \$11.9 billion in grant funding to California in FFY21, about seven percent of all grant funding awarded to the state.

DOT grant funding to the state declined about \$1 billion from the previous fiscal year, although was still nearly twice the average of FFY17 to FFY19.

DEFC funding from DOT accounted for \$4.5 billion (38%) in FFY21.


Over half (\$6.1 billion) of DOT grant funding to California was awarded by the Federal Transit Administration (FTA). The largest FTA grant program was the \$4 billion Federal Transit Formula Grant program (20.507). The Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) awarded another \$3.8 billion, much of which funded the \$3.7 billion Highway Planning and Construction program (20.205). The Federal Railroad Administration (FRA) and the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) each awarded approximately \$900 million to the state. Five additional subagencies awarded the remainder of grant funding.



Other major grant programs awarded to California include \$1.4 billion in Federal Transit Capital Investment Grants (20.500), \$928 million in High-Speed Rail Corridors and Intercity Passenger Rail Service Capital Assistance Grants (20.319), and \$897 million funded through the Airport Improvement Program (20.106).


DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE (USDA): \$5,171,052,982



The Department of Agriculture (USDA) awarded \$5.2 billion in grant funding to California in FFY21, about three percent of all federal grant funding to the state.

USDA grant funding to the state declined slightly from the previous fiscal year, although was still slightly greater than earlier fiscal years that averaged below \$5 billion. DEFC funding totaled \$475 million (9%) of USDA grant funding awarded in FFY21.

Approximately 95% (\$4.9 billion) of USDA grant funding awarded to California was through the Food and Nutrition Service (FNS) subagency which provides nutrition assistance programs.




The largest USDA grant program in California was the \$2.5 billion National School Lunch Program (10.555), followed by the \$1.2 billion State Administrative Matching Grants for the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (10.561) and the \$892 million WIC Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants, and Children (10.557). Other major USDA grant programs include \$120 million for Pandemic EBT Administrative Costs (10.649) and \$88 million for the Child and Adult Care Food Program (10.558).

The top recipient of USDA grant funding in California was the California Department of Education (\$2.6 billion), followed by the California Department of Social Services (\$1.3 billion), the California Department of Public Health (\$894 million), and the California Department of Food & Agriculture (\$115 million).

USDA awarded grants to California through 15 subagencies in FFY21. The amount of grant obligations by subagency is found in Appendix B.


DEPARTMENT OF HOUSING AND URBAN DEVELOPMENT (HUD): \$4,711,014,175



The Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) awarded \$4.7 billion in grant funding to California in FFY21, about three percent of all federal grant funding awarded to the state.

HUD grant funding to the state in FFY21 was more than twice the previous fiscal year (\$1.9 billion). Much of this increase was due to DEFC funding in response to COVID-19, which for HUD totaled \$2 billion (42%) in FFY21.

Approximately 93% (\$4.4 billion) of HUD grant funding to California was awarded through the Assistant Secretary for Community Planning and Development (CPD) subagency.




The largest HUD grant program awarded to California was the \$1.2 billion Community Development Block Grant State Program (14.228), followed by the \$867 million Home Investment Partnership Program (14.239), the \$807 million Emergency Solutions Grant Program (14.231), the \$760 million Community Development Block Grants Entitlement Grants (14.218), and the \$457 million Continuum of Care Program (14.267).

The top recipient of HUD grant funding to the state was the California Department of Housing & Community Development (\$1.9 billion), followed by the City of Los Angeles (\$464 million), the Los Angeles County Development Authority (\$150 million), the Housing Authority of the City of Los Angeles (\$108 million), and the City and County of San Francisco (\$89 million).

HUD awarded grants to California through six subagencies in FFY21. The amount of grant obligations by subagency is found in Appendix B.

DEPARTMENT OF HOMELAND SECURITY (DHS): \$4,367,765,724




The Department of Homeland Security (DHS) awarded \$4.4 billion in grant funding to California in FFY21, about three percent of all federal grant funding awarded to the state.

DHS grant funding to California in FFY21 was \$1.5 billion more than the previous fiscal year and \$3.4 billion more than in FFY19.

The increase in DHS funding is attributable to DEFC COVID-19 spending, which equaled \$4 billion (91%) in FFY21.

Over 99% (\$4.3 billion) of DHS grant funding to the state was awarded by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), a subagency of DHS.




The largest DHS grant program awarded to California in FFY21 was the \$3.6 billion Disaster Grants – Public Assistance for Presidentially Declared Disasters (97.036), which accounted for 83% of all DHS grant funding to the state. Other DHS grant programs funded in the state included \$206 million in Homeland Security Grants (97.067), \$177 million in Fire Management Assistance Grants (97.046), \$130 million in Hazard Mitigation Grants (97.039), and \$52 million for the Staffing for Adequate Fire and Emergency Response (SAFER) program (97.083).

Most (\$4.2 billion, or 96%) of DHS funding to the state was awarded to the California Office of Emergency Services, most of which was subawarded to local governments.

DHS also awarded grants to California through its subagencies Countering Weapons of Mass Destruction (CWMD), the U.S. Coast Guard (USCG), and the U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS). The amount of grant obligations by subagency is found in Appendix B.

DEPARTMENT OF LABOR (DOL): \$1,932,523,653




The Department of Labor (DOL) awarded \$1.9 billion in grant funding to California in FFY21, about one percent of all grant funding awarded to the state.

DOL grant funding to the state increased significantly from its previous totals of \$1 billion in FFY19 and \$1.4 billion in FFY20.

DEFC funding in response to COVID-19 accounted for nearly \$800 million (41%) of DOL funding in FFY21.


The largest DOL grant program was \$1.2 billion (64%) for Unemployment Insurance (17.225), which finances the cost of unemployment insurance program administration.



The top recipient of DOL grant funding in the state was the California Department of Employment Development with \$1.8 billion, much of which was subawarded to local governments including the City of Los Angeles (\$30 million), the County of Los Angeles (\$26 million), the County of San Bernardino (\$26 million), the San Diego Workforce Partnership (\$24 million), and the County of Riverside (\$20 million).

The vast majority (96%) of DOL grant funding was awarded through its subagency the Employment and Training Administration (ETA). Other DOL subagencies providing grant funding to California were the Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA), Veterans Employment and Training Services (VETS), Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS), Office of the Assistant Secretary for Administration and Management (OASAM), and Mine Safety and Health Administration (MSHA). The amount of grant obligations by subagency is found in Appendix B.

NATIONAL SCIENCE FOUNDATION (NSF): \$1,046,217,177



The National Science Foundation (NSF) awarded over \$1 billion in grants to California in FFY21, about one percent of all grant funding awarded to the state.

NSF grant funding to the state has remained relatively stable over the past few fiscal years. DEFC funding accounted for about \$82 million (8%) of NSF’s grant funding to California in FFY21.



NSF grants funded research and education in multiple fields of science and engineering, including \$232 million for Mathematical and Physical Science (47.049), \$178 million for Engineering (47.041), \$174 million for STEM Education, \$147 million for Computer and Information Science and Engineering (47.070), and \$141 million for Geosciences (47.050).

Other NSF grants awarded to California in FFY21 included \$115 million for Biological Sciences (47.074), \$29 million for Social, Behavioral, and Economic Sciences (47.075), \$17 million for Integrative Activities (47.083), \$9 million for Polar Programs (47.078), and \$3 million for the Office of International Science and Engineering (47.079).

The top recipient of NSF grant funding in the state was the University of California San Diego (\$136 million), followed by the Regents of the University of California (\$100 million), the California Institute of Technology (\$79 million), Stanford University (\$70 million), and the University of California Los Angeles (\$66 million). Nearly 300 universities, institutes, corporations, and other entities received funding in FFY21 to perform research and development work in California through NSF grants.

NSF funding is not divided by subagency.

DEPARTMENT OF DEFENSE (DOD): \$654,549,146



The Department of Defense (DOD) awarded approximately \$655 million in grants to California in FFY21.


DOD grant funding to the state has averaged \$700 million over the past few fiscal years, with the exception of FFY18 when it was closer to \$500 million.

DEFC funding in response to COVID-19 totaled \$55 million (8%) of all DOD grant funding to the state in FFY21.

The largest DOD grant program awarded to California in FFY21 was Military Medical Research and Development (12.420) with \$150 million in funding, followed by \$112 million for Basic and Applied Scientific Research (12.300). National Guard Military Operations and Maintenance (O&M) Projects (12.401) received \$100 million in funding. Research and Technology Development (12.910) and Basic Scientific Research (12.431) received \$97 million and \$60 million, respectively.

Over half (\$368 million) of all DOD grant funding to the state was awarded by the Department of the Army (USA). The Department of the Navy (USN) awarded California \$127 million in grants, followed by \$88 million in funding from the Department of the Air Force (USAF) and \$39 million from the Defense Advanced Research Projects Agency (DARPA). The amount of grant obligations by subagency is found in Appendix B.

DEPARTMENT OF ENERGY (DOE): \$583,189,132



The Department of Energy (DOE) awarded \$583 million in grants to California in FFY21, about \$78 million (15%) more than the previous fiscal year.

DEFC funding in FFY21 accounted for \$1.1 million, less than one percent of DOE’s total grant funding to the state.


Nearly half of all DOE grant funding in California was through the Office of Science Financial Assistance Program (81.049), which awarded nearly \$283 million.

Other DOE grants included \$74 million for Fossil Energy Research and Development (81.089), \$72 million for Renewable Energy Research and Development (81.087), \$67 million for Conservation Research and Development (81.086), and \$57 million for Advanced Research Projects Agency – Energy (81.135).

The top recipient of DOE grant funding in California was General Atomics (\$114 million), followed by Membrane Technology and Research (\$52 million), Heliogen Holdings (\$35 million), the University of California San Diego (\$28 million), Stanford University (\$21 million), the University of California Los Angeles (\$21 million), Natron Energy (\$20 million), Electrical Power Research Institute (\$19 million), the University of California Irvine (\$19 million), and the California Institute of Technology (\$19 million).

DOE does not award funding through any subagencies.

ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION AGENCY (EPA): \$384,543,139



The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) awarded \$385 million in grants to California in FFY21.

EPA grant funding to the state declined \$83 million (18%) from the previous fiscal year, although FFY21 funding was still somewhat greater than earlier fiscal years (FFY17 through FFY19) that averaged less than \$350 million.


DEFC funding exceeded \$2 million in FFY21, about one percent of EPA's total grant funding to the state.

The two most significant EPA grant programs awarded to the state were the Clean Water State Revolving Fund (66.458) and the Drinking Water State Revolving Fund (66.468), which received over \$113 million and \$103 million, respectively. EPA also funded over \$30 million toward the Targeted Airshed Grant Program (66.956), nearly \$21 million for Air Pollution Control Program Support (66.001), and nearly \$15 million for Water Pollution Control State, Interstate, and Tribal Program Support (66.419).

The top recipient of EPA grant funding in the state was the California Water Resources Control Board with \$253 million, much of which was allocated to the Clean Water and Drinking Water State Revolving Funds to finance the construction of water and wastewater infrastructure investments and other water quality improvements.

EPA does not award funding through any subagencies.

DEPARTMENT OF THE INTERIOR (DOI): \$333,937,447




The Department of the Interior (DOI) awarded \$334 million to California in FFY21.

DOI grant funding to the state has remained at approximately \$350 million over the past three fiscal years.

DEFC funding amounted to over \$4 million in FFY21, about one percent of all grant funding awarded by DOI to the state that year.


DOI awarded the state over \$64 million for Title XVI Water Reclamation and Reuse (15.504), followed by \$39 million in Central Valley Improvement Act, Title XXXIV (15.512) funding. Other major grant programs included \$21 million for Wildlife Restoration and Basic Hunter Education (15.611), \$17 million for Tribal Self-Governance (15.022), and \$17 million for Sport Fish Restoration (15.605).



The top recipient of DOI funding in the state was the California Department of Fish & Wildlife (\$55 million), followed by Monterey One Water (\$20 million), the California Department of Parks and Recreation (\$20 million), the South Coast Water District (\$12 million), and the California Department of Water Resources (\$11 million).

DOI grant funding to California was awarded through nine of its subagencies. The Bureau of Reclamation (BOR) funded \$137 million, followed by \$79 million from the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS), \$44 million from the National Park Service (NPS), \$29 million from the Bureau of Indian Affairs and Bureau of Indian Education (BIA/BIE), and \$20 million from the U.S. Geological Survey (USGS). The amount of grant obligations by subagency is found in Appendix B.

DEPARTMENT OF VETERANS AFFAIRS (VA): \$316,997,537



The Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) awarded \$317 million in grant funding to California in FFY21.

VA grant funding to the state declined slightly from the previous fiscal year's total of \$335 million, although remains more than twice as much as that of FFY19 and earlier.


About half (\$163 million) of all VA grant funding to the state was designated as DEFC funding.

The largest VA grant program awarded to California was the \$196 million VA Supportive Services for Veteran Families Program (64.033), followed by \$92 million for Veterans State Nursing Home Care (64.015), \$17 million for Veterans State Domiciliary Care (64.014), and \$11 million for the VA Homeless Providers Grant and Per Diem Program (64.024).

The top recipient of VA funding in the state was the California Department of Veterans Affairs (\$53 million), followed by Volunteers of America of Los Angeles (\$29 million), Nation's Finest (\$26 million), Veterans Home of California (\$21 million), and Adjoin (\$21 million). Other VA recipients included PATH (\$18 million), Swords to Plowshares Veterans Rights Organization (\$18 million), Berkeley Food and Housing Project (\$17 million), and the Salvation Army (\$15 million).

All VA grant funding to California in FFY21 was awarded by its subagency the Under Secretary for Health/Veterans Health Administration.

DEPARTMENT OF COMMERCE (DOC): \$187,250,703




The Department of Commerce (DOC) awarded \$187 million in grant funding to California in FFY21.

DOC grant funding awarded to California declined slightly from the \$194 million of the previous fiscal year, although is significantly more than earlier fiscal years that totaled less than \$150 million.

DEFC funding in FFY21 exceeded \$46 million, or one-fourth of all DOC grant funding to the state.


Over one-third of DOC grant funding to the state was through the \$68 million Economic Adjustment Assistance (11.307) program. DOC also funded \$17 million for Investments for Public Works and Economic Development Facilities (11.300), over \$15 million for the Manufacturing Extension Partnership (11.611), \$14 million for the Pacific Coast Salmon Recovery Pacific Salmon Treaty Program (11.438), and \$10 million for the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) Cooperative Institutes (11.432).



The top recipient of DOC grants in the state was the University of California San Diego (\$21 million), followed by California Manufacturing Technology Consulting (\$16 million), the California Department of Fish & Wildlife (\$15 million), the City of Chico (\$13 million), and the City of Tracy (\$8 million).

DOC awarded grant to California through six of its subagencies in FFY21. The Economic Development Administration (EDA) awarded over \$88 million, followed by the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) at \$71 million. The amount of grant obligations by subagency is found in Appendix B.

NATIONAL AERONAUTICS AND SPACE ADMINISTRATION (NASA): \$180,722,950



The National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) awarded over \$180 million to California in FFY21.

NASA grant funding to the state has remained between \$150 and \$200 million over the past five fiscal years.



No NASA grant funding awarded to California was categorized as DEFC funding in FFY21.

Three-fourths of NASA grant funding in the state was through its \$135 million Science (43.001) program. NASA also awarded \$19 million for Aeronautics (43.002), \$16 million for Space Technology (43.012), \$4 million through the Office of Stem Engagement (43.008), \$3 million for Safety, Security, and Mission Services (43.009), \$2 million for Space Operations (43.007), and \$2 million for Exploration (43.003).

The top recipient of NASA grant funding in the state was the Bay Area Research Institute (\$22 million), followed by the Regents of the University of California (\$21 million), the California Institute of Technology (\$19 million), the San Jose State University Research Foundation (\$17 million), the University of California Los Angeles (\$15 million), and the SETI Institute (\$14 million). Other NASA grant recipients included the University of California San Diego (\$7 million), Stanford University (\$7 million), the University of California Santa Barbara (\$6 million), and the University of California Davis (\$6 million).

NASA grant funding is not divided by subagency.

DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE (DOJ): \$296,706,223



The Department of Justice (DOJ) awarded nearly \$297 million in grants to California in FFY21.

DOJ grant funding to the state has declined annually from a high in FFY18 of approximately \$640 million.


DEFC funding from DOJ to the state was -\$1,800 in FFY21, reflecting a deobligation of a grant award, or downward adjustment of previously obligated funds.

The largest DOJ grant program awarded to California was the \$120 million Crime Victim Assistance (16.575) program. DOJ also funded \$36 million for Crime Victim Compensation (16.576), \$19 million for the Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant Program (16.738), \$18 million for the VOCA Tribal Victim Services Set-Aside Program (16.841), and nearly \$10 million for the DNA Backlog Reduction Program (16.741).

The top recipient of DOJ funding in the state was the California Office of Emergency Services (\$124 million), followed by the California Victim Compensation Board (\$40 million), the Board of State and Community Corrections (\$24 million), the California Department of Justice (\$4 million), and Futures Without Violence (\$4 million).

The vast majority (91%) of DOJ grant funding awarded to California was through its Office of Justice Programs (OJP), with the remainder through other Offices, Boards and Divisions. The amount of grant obligations by subagency is found in Appendix B.

AMERICORPS [FORMERLY CORPORATION FOR NATIONAL AND COMMUNITY SERVICE (CNCS)]: \$71,610,270



AmeriCorps (formerly known as the Corporation for National and Community Service, or CNCS) awarded California nearly \$72 million in grant funds in FFY21.

AmeriCorps grant funding to the state increased by more than \$14 million from the previous year and more than \$23 million from FFY19.

DEFC funding accounted for over \$62 million (87%) of all AmeriCorps grant funding to the state in FFY21.


About 81% of AmeriCorps funding in the state was for the \$58 million AmeriCorps State and National Program (94.006). AmeriCorps also funded \$6 million for the Senior Foster Grandparent Program (94.011), \$3 million for the Retired and Senior Volunteer Program (94.002), and \$2 million for the Senior Companion Program (94.016).

The top recipient of AmeriCorps funding in the state was the Executive Office of the State of California (\$60 million) to support California Volunteers. The California Volunteers AmeriCorps State and National Program supports thousands of members providing services at hundreds of programs across the state.

Other awardees included the California Department of Developmental Services (\$1 million), the Seniors Council of Santa Cruz and San Benito Counties (\$1 million), Pepperdine University (\$1 million), and the County of Sacramento (\$739 million).

AmeriCorps does not issue grant awards by subagency.

AGENCY FOR INTERNATIONAL DEVELOPMENT (USAID): \$40,384,555



The U.S. Agency for International Development (USAID) awarded \$40 million in grants to California in FFY21.

USAID grant funding to the state has varied over the past few fiscal years between \$40 million and \$70 million.


DEFC funding accounted for \$22 million, over half of all USAID grant funding to the state.

Nearly all (98%) of USAID grant funding to California in FFY21 was through the Foreign Assistance for Programs Overseas (98.001) grant program. This Program works to support long-term and equitable economic growth and advance U.S. foreign policy objectives by supporting economic growth, agriculture and trade; global health; and democracy, conflict prevention and humanitarian assistance. USAID also funded \$820 million for the Development Partnerships for University Cooperation and Development (98.012). The Global Development Alliance (98.011) grant program reported -\$2,500 in funding to the state, representing a deobligation in funds.

The top recipient of USAID grant funding in the state was the Public Health Institute (\$18 million), followed by the University of California Davis (\$8 million), the Tides Center (\$4 million), the International Medical Corps (\$3 million), and the Aquaya Institute (\$2 million). Other recipients included the University of California Santa Barbara (\$2 million), Sustainable Fishery Advocates (\$1 million), Wheels for Humanity (\$911 million), and the University of California Berkeley (\$820 million).

USAID does not issue grant awards by subagency.

INSTITUTE OF MUSEUM AND LIBRARY SERVICE (IMLS): \$31,427,481



The Institute of Museum and Library Service (IMLS) awarded grants totaling over \$31 million to California in FFY21.

Grant funding from IMLS to the state increased \$4 million from the previous year and was over \$10 million more than FFY19.

Over \$11 million was categorized as DEFC funding, over one third of all IMLS grant funding awarded to the state in FFY21.


Approximately \$25 million (79%) of IMLS’s grant funding to California was obligated through the Grants to States (45.310) program, which supports public library services throughout the state.

Other IMLS grant programs awarded to the state included \$3 million from the Museums for America (45.301) program, \$2 million in National Leadership Grants (45.312), and over \$600,000 in both the Laura Bush 21st Century Librarian Program (45.313) and the Native American and Native Hawaiian Library Services (45.311) program. Other IMLS grant programs were nearly a quarter million dollars for both the Museum Grants for African American History and Culture (45.309) and the Native American/Native Hawaiian Museum Services Program (45.308).

The top recipient of IMLS grant funding in the state was the California State Library (\$25 million), primarily through the Grants to States program. Other IMLS awardees that received less than \$1 million each included the University of California Irvine, the San Jose Children’s Discovery Museum, the Yerba Buena Center for the Arts, the Zoological Society of San Diego, Pomona College, the Association of Moving Image Archivists, the Museum of African Diaspora, Loyola Marymount University, and the Children’s Museum of Orange County.

IMLS does not issue grant awards by subagency.

EXECUTIVE OFFICE OF THE PRESIDENT (EOP): \$31,400,989



The Executive Office of the President (EOP) awarded over \$31 million in grants to California in FFY21.

EOP funding to the state has remained relatively consistent over the past few fiscal years, ranging between \$28 to \$34 million annually.


No grant funding from EOP to the state was classified as DEFC funding in FFY21.

There was only one grant program awarded by EOP to California this year, the High Intensity Drug Trafficking Areas Program (95.001). This program works to reduce drug trafficking and drug production in the United States by facilitating cooperation among federal, state, local, and tribal law enforcement agencies to share information and implement coordinated enforcement activities; enhancing law enforcement intelligence sharing among federal, state, local, and tribal law enforcement agencies; providing reliable law enforcement intelligence to law enforcement agencies needed to design effective enforcement strategies and operations; and supporting coordinated law enforcement strategies which maximize use of available resources to reduce the supply of illegal drugs in designated areas and in the United States as a whole.

The top recipient of EOP grant funding in the state was the City of Monrovia (\$6 million), followed by Californians for Drug-Free Youth (\$5 million), the County of San Diego (\$5 million), the County of San Mateo (\$4 million), the Sacramento County Sheriff's Department (\$3 million), the City of Chula Vista (\$3 million), L.A. Impact (\$2 million), the County of Riverside (\$2 million), the County of Orange (\$1 million), and the County of San Bernardino (\$1 million).

All of EOP's grant funding to the state was awarded by its subagency the Office of the National Drug Control Policy (ONDCP).

SMALL BUSINESS ADMINISTRATION (SBA): \$21,611,593



The Small Business Administration (SBA) awarded nearly \$22 million in grant funding to California in FFY21.

SBA grant funding to the state in FFY21 was less than half the previous fiscal year's total of over \$48 million, which reflected an influx in DEFC funding in response to COVID-19.

In FFY21, DEFC funding accounted for about \$806 million, just four percent of SBA grant funding to the state.


The largest SBA grant program was the Small Business Development Centers (59.037) program, which awarded \$15 million, or 72% of all SBA awards to the state. This program provides management counseling, training, and technical assistance to the small business community through a network of Small Business Development Centers (SBDCs).

SBA also funded \$3 million for Women's Business Ownership Assistance (59.043) \$2 million towards the Microloan Program (59.046), \$730,000 to the Veterans Outreach Program (59.044), and less than \$300,000 each to both the 7(j) Technical Assistance (59.007) and the Prime Technical Assistance (59.050) programs.

The top recipient of SBA grant funding in the state was the Humboldt State University Sponsored Programs Foundation (\$5 million), followed by the Long Beach Community College District (\$4 million), the Fullerton Auxiliary Services Corporation (\$3 million), the University of California Merced (\$2 million), and the Southwestern Community College District (\$1 million).

SBA does not issue grant awards by subagency.

NATIONAL ENDOWMENT FOR THE HUMANITIES (NEH): \$16,773,523



The National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH) awarded nearly \$17 million to California in FFY21.

NEH grant funding in FFY21 increased \$4 million from the previous year and was nearly double earlier fiscal years (FFY17 to FFY19) that averaged \$9 million or less.


DEFC funding accounted for approximately \$11 million, or 65% of all NEH grant obligations to the state in FFY21.

NEH awarded California over \$6 million for the Promotion of the Humanities Federal/State Partnership (45.129), over \$4 million for the Promotion of the Humanities Public Programs (45.164), nearly \$3 million for the Promotion of the Humanities Fellowships and Stipends (45.160), and over \$1 million towards the Promotion of the Humanities Division of Preservation and Access (45.149). Other Promotion of the Humanities grant programs supported by NEH in California included \$783,000 through the Office of Digital Humanities (45.169), \$721,000 for Research (45.161), \$693,000 for Professional Development, \$306,000 for Challenge Grants (45.130), and \$75,000 for Teaching and Learning Resources and Curriculum Development.

The top recipient of NEH grant funding in the state was California Humanities (\$6 million), followed by the National Writing Project (\$3 million), the Independent Television Service (\$2 million), the University of California Los Angeles (\$700,000), Museum Associates (\$400,000), the University Corporation (\$350,000), CSU Fullerton Auxiliary Services Corporation (\$324,000), the Internet Archive (\$305,000), and California State University Stanislaus (\$249,000).

NEH does not issue grant awards by subagency.

NATIONAL ENDOWMENT FOR THE ARTS (NEA): \$11,552,583



The National Endowment for the Arts (NEA) awarded nearly \$12 million in grant funding to California in FFY11.

NEH grant funding to the state was \$4 million less than the previous fiscal year, although was more than earlier fiscal years that averaged less than \$10 million.

DEFC funding in FFY21 amounted to over \$1 million, 12% of all NEA grant funding awarded to the state that year.


NEA grants to the state were provided through just two grant programs: nearly \$9 million for Promotion of the Arts Grants to Organizations and Individuals (45.024) and nearly \$3 million in Promotion of the Arts Partnership Agreements (45.025).

The top recipient of NEA grant funding in the state was the California Arts Council (\$3 million), which provides subawards to individuals and organizations through a number of its grant programs funded through the NEA Promotion of the Arts Partnership Agreement.

NEA awarded less than a half million dollars each to hundreds of other recipients across the state including the San Francisco Jazz Organization, the Regents of the University of California San Francisco, the University of California San Diego, California Lawyers for the Arts, the County of Los Angeles, the Trust for Public Land, and the Los Angeles Philharmonic Association.

NEA does not issue grant awards by subagency.

SOCIAL SECURITY ADMINISTRATION (SSA): \$4,705,923



The Social Security Administration (SSA) awarded almost \$5 million in grant funding to California in FFY21.

SSA grant funding has remained consistent over the past three fiscal years, although FY 21 funding is more than twice the totals of both FFY17 and FFY18.


No SSA grant funds were classified as DEFC funding in FFY21.

SSA awarded grants to California through two grant programs: nearly \$3 million in Social Security State Grants for Work Incentives Assistance to Disabled Beneficiaries (96.009) and nearly \$2 million for the Social Security Work Incentives Planning and Assistance Program (96.008).

The top recipient of SSA grant funding in the state was Disability Rights California (\$3 million). Other recipients included the Center for Independence of Individuals with Disabilities, the MCS Economic Development Corporation, Pride Industries, Managed Career Solutions, Project Independence, and Disability Resources Agency for Independent Living, all of which received less than \$300,000 each.

SSA does not issue grant awards by subagency.

DEPARTMENT OF THE TREASURY (TREAS): \$3,981,089



The Department of the Treasury (TREAS) awarded approximately \$4 million in grants to California in FFY21.

TREAS grant funding to California was nearly \$1 million more than the previous year.


No TREAS grant funds were identified as DEFC funding.

TREAS awarded grants to the state in FFY21 through three grant programs. The largest grant program was nearly \$3 million for the Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) Matching Grant Program (21.009), followed by over \$1 million for Low Income Taxpayers Clinics (21.008) and about \$70,000 for Tax Counseling for the Elderly (21.006).

The top recipient of TREAS grant funding in the state was the United Way of the Bay Area (\$594,000), followed by Koreatown Youth and Community Center (\$435,000), the University Corporation (\$315,000), Community Action Partnership of Kern (\$167,000), Community Action Partnership of Riverside County (\$163,000), and United Way CA Capital Region (\$155,000). Organizations receiving less than \$150,000 in grants included Orange County's United Way, Community Services & Employment Training, United Way of the Wine Country, and Chinese Newcomers Service Center.

All of TREAS's grant funding in FFY21 was awarded through its subagency the Internal Revenue Service (IRS).

NATIONAL ARCHIVES AND RECORDS ADMINISTRATION (NARA): \$307,707



The National Archives and Records Administration (NARA) awarded nearly \$308,000 in grants to California in FFY21.

NARA grant funding to the state was over \$100,000 more than the previous fiscal year, but less than half its peak funding of nearly \$800,000 in FFY18.


No NARA grants were through DEFC funding.

There was just one NARA grant program awarded to California in FFY21, the National Historical Publications and Records Grants (89.003). This program is used to undertake a wide-range of activities related to the preservation, publication, and use of documentary sources relating to the history of the United States.

The top recipient of NARA grant funding in the state was Stanford University (\$160,000), followed by the Regents of the University of California San Francisco (\$150,000).

NARA grants were awarded through its subagency the National Historical Publications and Records Commission (NHPRC). NHPRC is the grant-making affiliate of the National Archives and Records Administration whose mission is to promote the preservation and use of America's documentary heritage essential to understanding our democracy, history, and culture.

NUCLEAR REGULATORY COMMISSION (NRC): -\$36,098



The Nuclear Regulatory Commission (NRC) reported -\$36,000 in grant funding in FFY21, reflecting a deobligation of a previously funded award.

NRC funding to the state has consistently declined over the past five fiscal years.

NRC grant funding to the state was not classified as DEFC funding.


The NRC is an independent agency created to ensure the safe use of radioactive materials for beneficial civilian purposes while protecting people and the environment.

NRC grant funding to California in FFY21 represented a deobligation in funding through the U.S. Nuclear Regulatory Commission Office of Research Financial Assistance Program (77.009). This program makes awards to basic, advanced, and developmental scientific programs where the purpose is to create new or further define existing paradigms within the nuclear industry.

Grant recipients of the NRC included the Regents of the University of California (-\$3,000) and the Electric Power Research Institute (-\$33,000).

NRC grant funding is not awarded by subagency.

SCHOOLS




Schools in California received over \$11 billion in federal revenues in the 2021 fiscal year.³ Over \$10 billion of this funding was to School District General Funds and nearly \$809 million was awarded to the County School Service Funds of County Offices of Education.

Federal revenues to School Districts in FY21 was more than \$6 billion (160%) greater than the prior fiscal year's total of nearly \$4 billion. For County Offices of Education, federal revenues increased by more than \$137 million (20%) from the prior fiscal year.

Federal funding awarded to School Districts in California makes up about 12% of all General Fund Revenues. The majority (70%) of General Fund Revenues derives from Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF) revenues, which are funded through a combination of local property taxes and state funding from the State School Fund and Education Protection Account. For County Offices of Education, federal revenues represent 17% of County School Service Fund Revenues, with LCFF revenues making up about one-third of funding.

Federal revenues to schools (both School Districts and County Offices of Education) primarily derive from ED and USDA, with additional funding through DOJ, DOL, DOI, NSF, EPA, HHS, and DHS.

For all school districts, the annual average funding per student (from all revenue sources) was \$15,696 in FY21, nearly \$1,700 (12%) more than the prior fiscal year's average of \$14,013 per student.




LOCAL GOVERNMENTS



CITIES

City governments in California received over \$6 billion in federal revenue in fiscal year 2021.⁴ Over \$5 billion was categorized as “Intergovernmental-Federal” and another \$1 billion was categorized as “Nonoperating Revenues, Intergovernmental-Federal.” Federal revenue used by city governments to finance operations and services is often subject to restrictions on its use.


The total amount of federal revenue reported by cities in FY21 was more than twice the previous year’s sum of about \$3 billion and was about \$4 billion more than earlier fiscal years of FY17 through FY19. Federal revenues represented nearly seven percent of all revenues for city governments in FY21.

The largest source (nearly \$5 billion) of federal revenues to cities was categorized as “Other Federal Grants” with the specific grant program unidentified. These funds include the COVID-19 Coronavirus Relief Fund from the CARES Act, the Coronavirus State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds (SLFRF) authorized by the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA), and many other sources.

Federal revenues also supported Enterprise Funds for transit, airports, hospitals, electric, water, sewer, harbors and ports, and solid waste. Enterprise funds are proprietary funds, which are separate and apart from other governmental funds with their own assets and liabilities related to the service the fund supports.





Federal revenue for FY21 was reported to the California State Controller's Office for 454 of the total 482 municipalities in California that call themselves either cities or towns. Of the total 482 municipalities, 123 are charter cities and 359 are general law cities. San Francisco is a consolidated city-county and is reported as a city in this data.

Federal revenue (including both "Intergovernmental-Federal" and "Nonoperating Revenues, Intergovernmental-Federal") totaled nearly \$1.7 billion to the City of San Francisco, followed by \$1.2 billion to the City of Los Angeles, over \$350 million to the City of San Diego, and over \$280 million to the City of Long Beach.

The full list of total federal revenues by city in California is included in Appendix D.

COUNTIES



California county governments reported nearly \$19 billion in federal revenue in FY21.⁵ Over \$18 billion was categorized as “Intergovernmental-Federal” and nearly \$1 billion was identified as “Intergovernmental-Federal” as a subcategory within various Enterprise Funds.


Federal revenues to California counties increased by \$4 billion (30%) from the previous fiscal year and was \$7 billion more than FY19 and earlier fiscal years.

Total revenues to counties in the state in FY21 exceeded \$107 billion, with federal revenues representing about 18%.

The largest subcategory (\$8 billion) of federal revenues to counties was identified as “Federal – Other.” The “Federal – Other” subcategory included Health and Mental Health Grants, Road Projects, Workforce Investment Act, and many other programs. Nearly \$6 billion, however, was identified as “Other Federal – Other” and did not identify the revenue source. These funds include the COVID-19 Coronavirus Relief Fund from the CARES Act, the Coronavirus State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds (SLFRF) authorized by the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA), and many other sources. Another \$4 billion was dedicated to Public Assistance Administration: General and \$2 billion was for Public Assistance Programs: General. Other federal funding to counties was identified as Health Administration, Aid for Disasters, In-Lieu Taxes, Aid for Construction, and Enterprise Funds for Hospitals, Airports, Transit, Water, Solid Waste, Harbor and Port, and Sewer, among other revenue sources.





Federal revenue for FY21 was reported to the California State Controller's Office for 56 of the 58 counties in California. Humboldt County reported no federal revenues, and San Francisco as a consolidated city-county is reported as a city in this data, not here as a county.

Federal revenue [including both "Intergovernmental-Federal" and "Enterprise Funds (various): Intergovernmental-Federal"] totaled nearly \$5.9 billion to Los Angeles County, followed by over \$1.5 billion to San Diego County, nearly \$1.3 billion to Riverside County, and nearly \$1.2 billion to Orange County.

SPECIAL DISTRICTS



Special districts are a form of local government created to provide specialized services to communities. There are many different types of special districts found in California, including airport, air pollution control, cemetery, fire, healthcare, library, waste management, water, and many others.

Special districts received nearly \$4 billion in federal revenue in FY21, about 5% of the \$80 billion in total revenue of special districts across the state, identified as “Intergovernmental-Federal” revenues.

Federal revenues to special districts in FY21 increased \$1.5 billion (67%) from the prior fiscal year and were nearly three times that of FY 19.

The type of special district receiving the greatest amount of federal revenues was Transit Enterprise Funds with over \$2.7 billion (72%), followed by Governmental Funds with \$756 million (20%).

There were over 500 special districts that received federal funding in FY21. The special district that received the greatest amount of federal revenue was the Los Angeles County Metropolitan Transportation Authority (Metro) with over \$900 million, nearly one-fourth of all federal revenues to special districts in the state.

STATE GOVERNMENT


The vast majority of all federal funding in California is awarded to California State government agencies and departments. The California Department of Finance, on behalf of the California State government, is responsible for collecting federal expenditure information each year from State departments and agencies that received federal dollars in accordance with the Single Audit Act of 1984 (as amended in 1996) and the OMB's Uniform Guidance. This information is provided for the state fiscal year ending on June 30th, not the federal fiscal year.

The California State government reported federal grant expenditures of over \$228.3 billion in FY21, nearly \$85 billion (59%) more than the \$143.4 billion in FY20 due primarily to increased spending in response to the COVID-19 pandemic. Of the total expended by the State government, over \$30.5 billion was passed through to subrecipients. The federal agency providing the largest source of funding to the State government was DOL at \$93.2 billion, mostly in unemployment insurance payments, which is not reflected in the USA Spending data, and which explains the difference between the two data sources. Federal expenditures by the State government from HHS totaled nearly \$88.3 billion, followed by USDA with nearly \$17 billion.


The full list of federal expenditures by State Government by Federal Agency is included in Appendix E.

The largest single federal program expenditure was the DOL Unemployment Insurance program (Assistance Listing 17.225) at \$92.7 billion, followed by the HHS Medical Assistance Program (Assistance Listing 93.778) that provides Medicare and Medicaid payments at \$75.2 billion, and then the USDA Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) (Noncash) (Assistance Listing 10.551) at \$11.8 billion. The DOL Unemployment Insurance program and the USDA SNAP program are not reflected in the USA Spending federal fiscal year data, which categorize these as Direct Payments, not Grants. All federal expenditures by the State government by Assistance Listing are included in Appendix E.

There are over 60 State agencies or departments, identified by their "business unit" and organized by thirteen areas of government, responsible for the estimated \$228.3 billion in federal funds expended by the State government in FY21. The full list of federal expenditures by business unit and area of government is listed in Appendix E. State agencies reported submitting 554 applications for federal grant funding in FY21, of which 529 were awarded (95%). The list of number of applications and awards by business unit, type of federal grant, and Assistance Listing is also included in Appendix E.



OPR FEDERAL GRANT RESOURCES



PRESIDENTIAL EXECUTIVE ORDER NO. 12372

The State Clearinghouse at OPR serves as California’s Single Point of Contact for the intergovernmental coordination and review of proposed Federal financial assistance pursuant to Presidential Executive Order No. 12372 (EO 12372). The intention of the EO is to foster an intergovernmental partnership and a strengthened federalism by providing opportunities for consultation by elected officials of those State and local governments that would provide the non-Federal funds for, or that would be directly affected by, proposed Federal financial assistance or direct Federal development.



All applications for eligible federal grants subject to EO 12372 are required to be made available for review through submission on the OPR Intergovernmental Review of Federal Programs notification website ([OPR Intergovernmental Review of Federal Programs | EO 12372 | California](#)). All submissions are available for review online, and automated notifications of submissions are provided to registered state and local elected officials for review and comment. All comments received within the review period are

provided to the applicants, who are required to submit those comments to the federal agencies for consideration.

During FFY21, there were approximately 1,800 submissions made through OPR’s EO 12372 notification website.⁶ These submissions provided notice of applications for funding through 22 different federal agencies. Grant applications to HHS were the most common at over 400 submissions, followed by DOJ, USDA, and ED, which all had over 200 submissions.

Each EO 12372 submission indicates the location of the “Primary Place of Performance,” the primary location at which the project will be performed. Applicants for federal grants subject to EO 12372 submitted notifications for grants within 56 of California’s 58 counties and 322 different places of performance, which include both municipalities and unincorporated census-designated places. EO 12372 notifications were received for all State and Assembly Districts as well. The full lists of EO 12372 Submissions by Place of Performance for cities (including unincorporated areas) counties, and State Assembly and Senate Districts are included in Appendices D and E.




TRAINING SESSIONS

As the state's primary point of contact for information on federal grants, the State Clearinghouse has facilitated numerous training opportunities to encourage and improve the ability of people and organizations in California to pursue and manage federal grants. During FFY21, the State Clearinghouse hosted a series of four federal grants webinars, presented by the consultant Karen Norris, a nationally recognized subject matter expert in federal grants management and compliance. Each session was 60 to 90 minutes including opportunities for audience questions and answers. The following four webinars were presented, and both the presentation slides and recordings are available through [the OPR website](#):

1. Federal Grants Update for 2021. The Office of Management and Budget (OMB) recently released the Final Rule of the updated Uniform Guidance, the overall framework for management of federal funding. The OMB Uniform Guidance is a living document. Revisions occur over time as new legislation and other requirements are implemented. This presentation describes recent changes in requirements from the prior version of the Uniform Guidance to this latest version, including: (1) key federal regulations that impact grants, (2) funding and issues that place grants at risk, (3) updates to the Uniform Guidance, and (4) other resources to stay current.
2. Procurement Provisions Under the Uniform Guidance. Procurement provisions under the Uniform Guidance are more restrictive than provisions under the prior Office of Management and Budget (OMB) circulars. Nonfederal entities have had a difficult adjustment navigating the changes and aligning them with state and local procurement requirements. This presentation reviews the updated procurement provisions of the Uniform Guidance, including general procurement standards, free and open competition, methods of procurement, new procurement thresholds, limitations on sole source or noncompetitive bids, contracting with small and minority businesses, domestic preferences, recovered materials, and more.
3. Updating Policies and Procedures. With the implementation of the revised Uniform Guidance from the Office of Management and Budget (OMB), nonfederal entities need to note the changes and update, as necessary, their local policies and procedures. The revisions to local policies and procedures not only provide guidance to staff about the new requirements, but also strengthen their organization's system of internal control. This session reviews the provisions in the Uniform Guidance that require written policies and procedures and presents other suggestions for updating policies and procedures including boiler-plate templates that can be used for revising current or developing new policies and procedures.
4. When Plans Change, Amendments Offer Solutions. Unexpected circumstances can arise during federal grant implementation that include changes in key personnel, the need for no cost extensions, re-budgeting, and others. Delve into common issues that arise when plans change, and how to best address change through the amendment process that requires approval by awarding agencies. The session includes handy templates to assist with amendment requests.

OPR Federal Grant Webinars Attendees (FFY21)





Attendance for each session ranged from 16 to 65 attendees. A total of 98 unique individuals attended these sessions, with 29 of those individuals attending multiple sessions.

Attendees represented a wide range of jurisdictions and institutions – including state, city, county, higher education, tribal, nonprofit, special district, and regional – as well as private contractors and unaffiliated individuals. Individuals from state and city governments each made up about one-fourth of the attendees, followed by individuals from Institutes of higher education and then contractors/consultants.

Although attendance at these live sessions was lower than the previous year’s webinar series that ranged from 57 to 163 attending each session, thousands more people have benefited from viewing the recordings and downloading the slides. The “Federal Grants Update for 2021” recording for instance has received thousands of views, the most viewed video on the OPR YouTube page to date.

E-LIST



Since late 2019, the OPR State Clearinghouse has published a weekly E-List newsletter, the “Federal Grant Update.” This email newsletter highlights the latest in federal funding news, like legislative updates and award announcements, as well as a curated list of grant opportunities that were posted over the past week. Grant opportunities supporting community and regional planning, economic development, transportation and infrastructure, and public arts and culture are particularly featured, although topics range widely across all funding areas. The Federal Grant Update concludes with a calendar of upcoming webinars and in-person events related to grants, emphasizing all free or low-cost events.

The membership of the Federal Grant Update E-List grew by approximately 72% during FFY21, increasing from 457 to 787. By the end of FFY2022, the membership grew to nearly 1,400 recipients.

The membership of the Federal Grants Update E-List (currently over 1,500 recipients) is diverse with representatives from all levels of government along with the private sector.

The primary data source in this report is USASpending.gov, the official open data source of federal government spending data. Updates are published to the website about every two weeks, so the data shown here is a snapshot from the time it was downloaded and may not reflect current figures.
